IMPACT AND ACHIEVEMENTS

April 2023

Our Bridge to S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Gala celebration during our 50th Golden Anniversary raised \$500,000+ to support our programs.

May 2023

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. secured \$12 million in federal funding to expand our Active Engagement and Integration Project, a program that has served 41,000 pre - arrival clients since 2008.

June 2023

We purchased S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Harmony House's 33 assisted living units with a BC Housing grant to secure homes for seniors without future risk of eviction. S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Multicultural Early Childhood Development program was nominated for a service award from the BC Council of Families for work on immigrant mental health.

July 2023

Our Walk with the Dragon fundraiser in Stanley Park raised \$320,500 for our programs and we added service in Ukrainian to our crisis Help Lines.

August 2023

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. was named a Premier's Award Promoting Innovation and Excellence finalist in the partnership category for our work with government on housing displaced Ukrainians.

September 2023

Our S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Foundation Golf Tournament raised \$134,000+ for our programs and we launched our new Seniors Academy at our Annual General Meeting.

October 2023

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. was selected by the City of Coquitlam to develop and operate two seniors' rental buildings, adding 140 new affordable housing units in the region.

November 2023

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. underwent a successful reaccreditation with the Council on Accreditation, hosting surveyors in November and receiving our certification with exemplary standing.

December 2023

Our Tri - Cities Local Immigration Partnership launches a joint mentorship program pairing City of Coquitlam employees with local professionals. We also opened 21 new affordable housing units at Richmond's One Park.

January 2024

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. secured new BC Newcomers Services Program and BC Safe Haven program contracts, our Immigrant Settlement and Integration Program received accolades from IRCC for supporting Ukrainian arrivals and our Active Engagement and Integration Project began services to Central and South America.

February 2024

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. celebrates our donors and supporters with a ceremony at Choi Hall featuring the Honorable Lieutenant Governor of B.C., Janet Austin.

March 2024

The new S.U.C.C.E.S.S. - operated 231 - unit Bob and Michael's Place affordable housing building at 32 and 54 West Hastings Street in Chinatown opens for tours and tenant registrations.

INTEGRATED SERVICES FOR NEWCOMERS



Immigration and Settlement

This year S.U.C.C.E.S.S. served a record number of settlement clients with pre - arrival, port - of - entry and post - arrival settlement services.

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. supported Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada to deliver pre - arrival services through our Active Engagement and Integration Project to 8,200 clients including 1,200 clients coming from Colombia and Venezuela via the Humanitarian Pathway for the Americas. We also expanded online employment modules for refugee clients through our E-Start Program. Our Community Airport Newcomers Network program assisted 47,000 clients, including 7,100 Ukrainians, 8,100 refugees and 9,250 temporary foreign workers. Our Ukrainian Hotel Referrals project helped another 4,125 clients with housing.

Our Immigration Settlement and Integration Program served 38,577 individuals in Metro Vancouver and Fort St. John, a 58 per cent increase in one year. Our ACT program expanded to new locations and provided intensive case management to nearly 300 clients with high needs and barriers, while the team participated in a BC Settlement Collaborative Case Management Service Model research project.

Our BC Newcomers Services Program (formerly BCSIS) expanded 30 per cent last year, serving 7,729 clients across Metro Vancouver and in three Northeast BC municipalities.

Youth

This year, S.U.C.C.E.S.S. supported 123 youth, including newcomers, refugees, racialized youth, and youth with disabilities to develop leadership skills, practice inclusivity and reconciliation. In our Community Leadership Initiative program, 42 youth in six cohorts organized community microgrant projects to enrich and engage their neighborhoods in five areas of Metro Vancouver. Our Youth Leadership Millennium program helped develop the resilience of 81 youth through dozens of educational events promoting reconciliation, diversity, equity and inclusion.

Employment and Entrepreneurship

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. helped nearly 3,400 job seekers and worked with 150 employers over the past year. Our Active Career Connect and Engagement Project supported 127 immigrants in B.C. and Ontario and was recognized with a Toronto South Local Immigration Partnership Collaboration Award for excellence.

Our Integrated Women Entrepreneurship Project empowered 394 women living in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick to start their own businesses. Our Internationally Trained Dentists

Program helped 89 clients prepare for licensing exams, speeding their professional reintegration. Similarly, our International Credential Recognition Support Program helped 150 health professionals prepare for exams and secure employment in the health sector.

Our WorkBC Richmond Centre saw great success in supporting 2,550+ job seekers from diverse backgrounds, (including immigrants, people with disabilities, youth and survivors of violence), achieving a nearly 28 per cent increase in jobs secured.

Community, Family and Wellness

Our Wellness and Active Communities programs helped 2,972 clients through diverse programs, including Better at Home, Chinatown Senior Services Council, Digital Literacy, Health Education, Safe Seniors Strong Communities, Seniors Academy, Seniors Quality of Life, Social Prescribing and neighbourhood seniors' groups.

Settlement and Family Services served 48,859 clients across five programs: Action, Commitment, Transformation, BC Newcomer Services Program, Burnaby Multicultural Early Years Services, Immigration Settlement and Integration Program and Tri - Cities Multicultural Early Childhood Development. We also launched a Public Health Agency of Canada - funded mental health project for immigrant families.

Our S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Help Lines volunteers responded to over 6,100 calls last year. Help Lines were founded in 2002 and today are available in English, Mandarin, Cantonese, Korean, Farsi/Dari, and Ukrainian. We also delivered counselling to 319 clients.

Our Champions of S.U.C.C.E.S.S. volunteer program also continued strong, with an appreciation event in November for 150 dedicated volunteers. We are grateful to our 2,000 registered volunteers and 500 active volunteers.

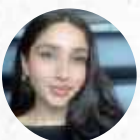
Community Advocacy, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion:

The Tri - Cities Local Immigration Partnership engaged 400 partners in diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives. In October, we launched the Anti - Racism Toolkit: How to Report Incidents of Racism in collaboration with Port Moody Police, experts and individuals with lived experience. In November, we hosted a presentation on a report called “A Sense of Belonging: Sexual and Gender Minority Newcomers in the Tri - Cities,” identifying barriers and recommendations to improve inclusion for LGBTQ2SIA+ newcomers.

Three of our research projects, the Tri - Cities Community - Based Funding Model Project, Anti - Oppression Capacity Building Project, and the Tri - Cities Wraparound Model of Care for Mental Health in Immigrant Families, celebrated their conclusion. We were proud to be nominated for a BC Multiculturalism Award in the Breaking Barriers category.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

In 2023 - 2024, S.U.C.C.E.S.S. continued its commitment to addressing the affordable housing crisis in British Columbia. One significant achievement during this time was the opening of OnePark in Richmond providing 21 units for low - to moderate - income individuals, families, and seniors. In April 2024, an additional 231 affordable housing units will be completed at Bob and Michael's Place. This project is a collaborative effort between S.U.C.C.E.S.S., the Vancouver Chinatown Foundation, the City of Vancouver, and BC Housing. These

new units aim to address the ongoing affordable housing crisis in the region, providing secure and accessible housing options for those in need.

In the future, S.U.C.C.E.S.S. has ambitious plans to expand its impact on affordable housing. Through strategic partnerships with BC Housing, municipal governments, and private developers, new locations currently under development will add over 1,250 housing units. This significant expansion aims to dramatically

increase housing opportunities for individuals and families facing housing challenges. By expanding housing capacity, S.U.C.C.E.S.S. is committed to creating a lasting positive impact on community members in need of secure and affordable housing options.

The accomplishments of 2023 - 2024 and planned future projects exemplify S.U.C.C.E.S.S.'s unwavering commitment to addressing the affordable housing crisis.

MULTI - LEVEL CARE

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Multi-Level Care Society manages the Simon K. Y. Lee Seniors Care Home, a long-term care facility offering culturally appropriate care to seniors with complex needs. The Society operates two assisted living facilities for seniors: Austin Harris Residence in Richmond and Harmony House in Vancouver. We also run two Adult Day Programs in Vancouver and Richmond serving 200 seniors each week, providing a continuum of care, and we provide nutritious Chinese meals for the Burnaby Meals on Wheels program.

Our major accomplishments over the past year include partnering with the province and BC Housing to purchase Harmony House, preventing much - needed affordable housing from being lost to the private market and ensuring seniors living there can age in place in their neighborhood.

We also completed capital upgrades at the Simon K.Y. Lee Seniors Care Home, installing 35 new ceiling lifts and investing in critical infrastructure upgrades in our heating, cooling and ventilation systems and our building security system. And, we moved ahead with our Suzhou Alley project, securing a safe, gated outdoor garden space for residents here.





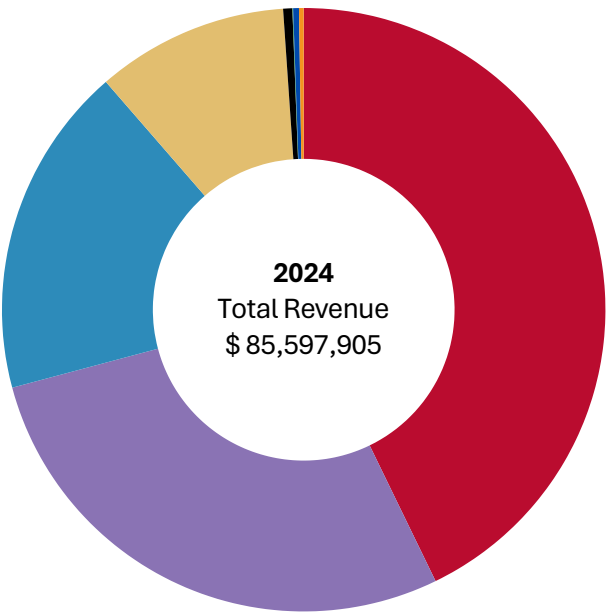
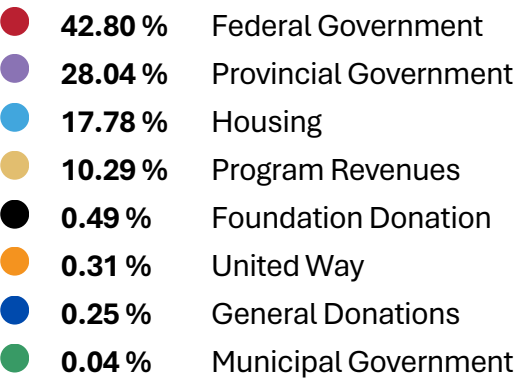
